Read this first.

Sometimes a story about you doesn't turn out quite the way you imagined. In August 2008 John Harley Weston got a call from a journalist at the Scottish Daily Express newspaper who wanted to do an article about Channel 7 Television featuring John's songs on their Beijing Olympics playlist. Below is the article/transcript that the journalist sent to his editor....it's nothing like the story that actually appeared in the newspaper - circled in red on opposite page.

AN EXILED Scottish musician is on course for a surprise hit in Australia, after his version of Waltzing Matilda was chosen to feature in a national TV station's Olympic coverage.

Singer songwriter, John Harley Weston, who originally hails from Ayrshire, is hoping the coverage will boost sales of online downloads of the track, which has been re-released as a single, and help make it a worldwide hit.

More than half of Australia's prime time viewing audience, over 5 million people, have already tuned into Channel 7's coverage.

John, who has previously supported Wet, Wet, Wet and Duran Duran, said: "I've been playing it live for six years but I figure if I can't have a hit in Australia with Waltzing Matilda I've got no chance.

"I've had a couple of decent reviews and a few months ago I contacted the Australian Olympic Committee and eventually went to Channel 7, who are doing the official broadcasting, to see if the were interested in using it.

"I had dealings with them before because I wrote a song for the Brisbane Lions Aussie Rules team 1999.

"Eventually the executive producer had a listen and liked it and put the song on the playlist along with 'Believe in Yourself', which I worked on with another Scot, Sandy Iones from Wishaw

"Ian Anderson has played it on BBC Radio Scotland recently and it's definitely a song which can work all around the world."

'Waltzing Matilda', and a second song 'Believe In Yourself', both feature on John's album 'Welcome Back To Reality'. John says so far there's been no eyebrows raised about a Scot singing what is the country's unofficial anthem and points out that Andrew "Banjo" Paterson who penned the lyrics in 1895, had a Scottish father and the tune is based on an earlier Scottish melody.

He said: "There's an amazing tradition over here of Scots involved in music. Colin Hav of Men at Work is a Scotsman, Jimmy Barnes, who is Australia's biggest rock singer, and half of AC/DC

"Advance Australia Fair, the national anthem, was also written by a Scotsman, Peter Dodds McCormick, and Waltzing Matilda has a bit of a Scottish background too.

"The area where Banjo Paterson wrote the words at Dagworth station, north of Winton, is right out in the desert and even now you hear Scottish accents in a lot of the towns.

"He was first played the tune he used, Thou Bonnie Woods of Craigielea, by Christina Macpherson. She never gets credited which is a terrible shame."

Until 1997 John Harley Weston, as he is now known, was plain John Higgins from Stewarton and used to front Scottish band Frontier, who had Texas and Dire Straits as labelmates and toured with Wet. Wet. Wet and Gun.

But then after meeting his Australian wife, he swapped Stewarton for Surfers Paradise on the Australian Gold Coast.

The 41-year-old now lives on Tamborine Mountai with wife Susan, and daughter Mackenzie, 6.


He added: "It's a wonderful place to live with rainforest, wonderful weather and brilliant beaches but I do miss a decent pint and a great Glasgow pu I'm starting to get referred to as the exiled Scot so better get back and see my mum and dad soon."

John's hoping to raise thousands for Amnesty International with downloads of the track which is available on iTunes.

He said: "I would love to raise 10,000 dollars to give to Amnesty to show that the Olympics and human rights can work together. I'd love it to be a hit with people back home too.

"It's a chance to make a small donation toward a better world and fire up the music industry at the same time."
